Dear Friends,

In the wake of the events of the last week I am drawn to the words of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., "The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy."

I leave you with the words of author L.R. Knost, "Do not be dismayed by the brokenness of the world. All things break and all things can be mended. Not with time, as they say, but with intention. So go. Love intentionally, extravagantly, unconditionally. The broken world waits in darkness for the light that is you."

SDS UPDATE

Heather Chord, the new IDD Unit Manager shared the numbers:

- ⇒ 813 on the DDRR (waitlist)
- ⇒ 24 IDD waivers drawn
- ⇒ 76 ISW waivers drawn
- \Rightarrow 432 ISW's active.

Governor Dunleavy has declared an updated Public Health Emergency from January 16th to February 15th. The National Public Health Emergency has been extended for another 90 days until April 21, 2021.

Appendix K—States can request a 6 month extension of the flexibilities at the end of the Public Health Emergency. Alaska is ready to submit that request.

SDS will look at remote day habilitation and teleservices in a waiver amendment but not in the waiver renewal application out for public comment now due in June. The Renewal contains minimal changes with chore services moving to CFC services. Public comment is due February 12th. The state is hosting cafés to discuss remote services with those receiving services.

<u>Vaccines</u>—No mandate for the vaccine will be issued by the state. Vaccine available for DSPs and those in residential settings now.35,000 have received their first shot. No word on when folks with IDD, not in congregate settings will be eligible.

<u>EVV</u> for IDD providers not on SDS's radar for foreseeable future.

<u>Family Habilitation</u> alignment with CMS still being worked on with HCBS strategies. Changes required have been delayed by the pandemic.

LEADERSHIP CONSORTIUM

Applications are now open for the Leadership Consortium. You may apply for two seats but make your first choice clear. Classes begin April 14th through May 5 meeting two morning each week. Registration closes February 5th and registration fee is \$500 per person attending.

DSPHire App and Marketing Campaign

The Alaska Community Foundation Grant awarded to AADD has been completed. Northwest Strategies was hired to develop 30 and 60 second ads to market DSP jobs. The ads have aired in all regions of the state and in hub communities via Cable, ESPN, food, on YouTube, Facebook, ADN, LinkedIn and Connected TV.

Jake Carpenter is working on the App DSPHire full time. From 3-4 testbed ads on the App there are now 27 different employers posting ads. And the actual hits to DSPHire went from 5 to 10 a week to over 1,000 hits the week of December 27th.

The Trust is processing a grant to allow the marketing to continue and the DSPHire App has some funds for marketing. We look forward to hearing about new DSPs as a result of this marketing campaign. A huge shout out to our Kim Champney for being the champion behind this work.
